What We Believe


This Plan is based on several beliefs held dearly by LCS and the ability of LCS to carry out its mission.

- We believe that Christian education, at its core, is relational and that we need to meet face-to-face whenever conditions permit us to be effective in our mission of training scholars, making disciples, and graduating leaders. (<u>LCS Student Handbook</u>)
- We believe that a plan should hold student learning and their long term social and emotional needs at the highest levels. (Adverse Childhood Experiences, Reading)
- We believe that we need to partner with parents to support their child's educational needs while allowing them to maintain their ability to meet their family's financial needs.
- We believe that any implemented plan should be collaborative, financially feasible, operationally practical, acceptable by the majority of our constituents, and individually tailored to the community of LCS.
- We believe that we should be considerate of the needs of all LCS stakeholders, including our teachers and other employees.
- We believe that the physical environment at LCS needs to support the health and healthy behaviors of our students, staff, and families. (<u>CDC Considerations for Schools to Reopen, CDC Cleaning Guidance</u>)
- We believe that mental health, along with the physical health of the child, should be considered equally. (<u>Anxiety Research, Adverse Childhood</u> Experiences Study)
- We believe that from a biblical perspective, we are to submit to those in government who have the rule over us. We are also to care for all mankind and especially those who we have influence over. (Romans 13:1-2)
- We believe that stakeholder input is valuable, and the needs of our constituents should be heard and considered.
- We believe that we should be considerate of our risk tolerance and wise in our understanding of trade-offs.
- We believe that by coming to LCS, parents, families, and other stakeholders voluntarily assume a certain level of risk daily, just as families that attend
 other schools do. An inherent risk of exposure to COVID-19 exists in any public place where people are present. By attending LCS, parents voluntarily
 assume all risks related to exposure to COVID-19 and any other contagious disease.
- We believe that we have a responsibility to train the next generation of heavenly and earthly citizens who are contributors, thinkers, truth-seekers, morally founded on the Word, empathetic, persistent, resourceful, resilient, young adults who live by faith. Therefore, we must train our students to be governed by Biblical principles.

The LCS Administration and School Board recognize the authority of the IDOE and Government of Indiana. When the leeway exists surrounding recommendations, LCS will determine which recommendations to follow as is necessary to safely and effectively carry out the mission of Lakeview Christian Schools.

LCS recognizes that this Plan is a living document and may change as we learn new information and as the impact of this virus changes.

LCS Return-to-School Plan



Plan Highlights

LCS will return to school on August 5th.

- Students (3rd-12th grades) and staff will be required to wear masks per the Govenor's Executive Order.
- Students and staff will have their temperatures taken on a regular basis at the beginning of the day.
- Students and staff will be required to be fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication before returning to school or have been cleared by the individual's health care provider.
- LCS will employ enhanced cleaning procedures with additional hand sanitizing stations available.
- Students will be required to provide a personal, transparent water bottle.
- LCS will allow the use of water fountains for bottle refills only.
- Accommodations will be made to the lunch, playground, and chapel programs as necessary, depending on the stage we are in.
- LCS will restrict non-essential volunteers, visitors, and guests in the building.
- Management of any confirmed case of COVID-19 will be handled in a cooperative manner between LCS and the Grant County Health Department.
- Students who have tested positive for COVID-19 may return to school after the school receives a documented release from the student's health care provider.
- If any individual in one's home has COVID-19 or is quarantined because of COVID-19 (also including direct contact with a positive case), those in the household should quarantine for a minimum of 14 calendar days starting after the positive individual's 10 day quarantine. Students may return to school after documented infection with COVID-19 as directed by the individual's health care provider.
- Below are the updated guidelines from the Grant County Health Department.
- 1. Quarantine can end after 7 days if the individual has remained without symptoms and a negative diagnostic test result. (The testing requirement would be to get tested on the 5th day after exposure so the test results would be available by the 7th day). However, to meet these criteria the individual will be required to continue daily monitoring and wear a mask through the 14th day.

or

2. Quarantine can end after 10 days without testing and the individual has remained without symptoms. However, to meet these criteria the individual will be required to continue daily monitoring and wear a mask through the 14th day.

Definitions

Face Coverings



Face coverings should be cloth and washed weekly. Recommendations regarding face coverings differ based on the level of community spread and can be found throughout this document. Information should be provided to staff, students, and families on proper use, removal, and washing of cloth face coverings. Any policy regarding face coverings should be sensitive to the needs of students and staff with medical issues that make the wearing of a face-covering inadvisable. > CDC Guidance

Hand Sanitizer



Hand sanitizers should contain at least 60% alcohol and only be used with staff and older children who can safely use hand sanitizer. Hand soap should be used for younger children.

Clean/Disinfect



Teach the safe and correct application of disinfectants and keep out of reach of children.

When a Child or Staff Member Becomes Sick at School



- LCS will provide the school personnel, and other healthcare providers an isolation room or area to separate anyone who exhibits COVID-like symptoms.
- Anyone exhibiting COVID-like symptoms or assisting with procedures will be requied to wear a mask.
- School personnel will use Standard and Transmission-Based Precautions when caring for sick people.
- School administration will notify local health officials immediately of a confirmed case while maintaining confidentiality consistent with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and other applicable federal and State privacy laws.
- Advise sick staff members and children not to return until they have met CDC criteria to discontinue home isolation
- Train classroom teachers to handle minor health needs (bandages).
- Students who feel ill while at school will be evaluated per LCS policy.
- If they have a fever of 100.4 or higher, they will be moved to a holding room and sent home immediately.
- Students who are sent home with a fever or who present with a fever over the weekend and are not tested for COVID19 will not be allowed to return to school
 until they are fever-free without medication for 24 hours and other symptoms have improved and/or have been cleared by the individual's health care provider
- Students who have left school with a fever will be required to have their temperature taken by the LCS staff before they can re-enter the school.

Confirmed Case of COVID-19 on School Property



- If there is confirmation that a person infected with COVID-19 was on school property, the LCS administration will contact the Grant County Health Department, and the IDOE. Unless extenuating circumstances exist, LCS will work with the Grant County Health Department to assess factors such as the likelihood of exposure to employees and students in the building, the number of cases in the community, and other factors that will determine building closure.
- It is the responsibility of the Grant County Health Department to contact the person confirmed with COVID-19, inform direct contacts of their possible exposure, and give instructions to those involved with the confirmed case, including siblings and other household members regarding self-quarantine and exclusions. The individual who tested positive will not be specifically identified in communications to the school community at large (following HIPAA guidelines) but may need to be selectively identified for contact tracing by the local health department.
- If closure is determined necessary, LCS will consult with the Grant County Health Department to determine the status of school activities, including extracurricular activities, co-curricular activities, and before and after-school programs. As soon as LCS becomes aware of a student or employee who has been exposed to or has been diagnosed with COVID-19, the custodial staff will be informed, so that the impacted building, common areas, furnishings, and equipment are thoroughly disinfected. If possible, based upon student and staff presence, the custodial staff will wait 24 hours or as long as possible prior to cleaning. However, if that is not possible or school is in session, the cleaning will occur immediately.
- If any individual in one's home has COVID-19 or is quarantined because of COVID-19 (also including direct contact with a positive case), those in the household should quarantine for a minimum of 14 calendar days starting after the positive individual's 10 day quarantine. Students may return to school after documented infection with COVID-19 as directed by the individual's health care provider.
- Inform those who have had close contact with a person diagnosed with COVID-19 to stay home and follow CDC guidance if symptoms develop. If a person does not have symptoms, follow appropriate CDC guidance for home quarantine.

Considerations

CDC Considerations for Schools - As some communities in the United States open K-12 schools, CDC offers the following considerations for ways in which schools can help protect students, teachers, administrators, and staff and slow the spread of COVID-19. Schools can determine, in collaboration with state and local health officials to the extent possible, whether and how to implement these considerations while adjusting to meet the unique needs and circumstances of the local community. Implementation should be guided by what is feasible, practical, acceptable, and tailored to the needs of each community. School-based health facilities may refer to CDC's Guidance for U.S. Healthcare Facilities and may find it helpful to reference the Ten Ways Healthcare Systems Can Operate Effectively During the COVID-19 Pandemic. These considerations are meant to supplement—not replace—any state, local, territorial, or tribal health and safety laws, rules, and regulations with which schools must comply.

Task Force Strategies Considered for Moving Forward

The Task Force considered a number of strategies to move forward together to conduct school operations in a plan to return to school this fall.

Reopening of, and re-entry into school buildings is dependent on the trends and key data points referenced by the Governor. The goal with each of the topics considered is to assist in the articulation of a plan that can be easily communicated to members of the school community. We all want students and educators to feel comfortable returning to school.

The best way to do that is to identify solutions that make transitions to and from online learning and a return to in-person instruction, as seamless as possible. We have provided a checklist of items and considerations for the Plan.

Reopening Guidelines and Issues for Consideration

The COVID-19 pandemic has presented unique challenges across the State of Indiana. While emergency planning and recovery plans are part of any Emergency Operations Plan of a school facility, COVID-19 has posed additional concerns and requirements from a health perspective that may require non-traditional operations to facilitate a return to the learning environment.

Key areas have been identified to assist with Re-entry into schools and are aligned with the U.S. Department of Education Readiness and Emergency Management for Schools Technical Assistance Centers Recovery Fact Sheet identified below (Note – additional information on areas identified below are further developed in other sections of the Recovery Plan):

Personnel:

Mental Health:

- Support services for loss of any staff, students, or family
- Announce counseling support services available to faculty and staff via Employee Assistance Programs that are available
- Hold faculty and staff meetings to provide information on signs and symptoms to observe in students
- Communicate counseling support services available to students
- Have resources available for staff, students, and parents that help deal with loss, grief, stress, etc.
- Work with faculty and staff on identifying families in need of long term physical and mental health support and intervention and provide resources to families

Facilities:

- Determine if daily screening is required by Local Health Department
- Meet with local health department to determine social distancing requirements, if any, to determine allowable seating within each classroom
- Determine school-based procedures for staff, student, parent communications
- Review procedures for sending ill persons home from the school facility
- Has signage been increased in restrooms on proper hygiene techniques
- Determine if additional cleaning requirements are needed prior to reopening of school facilities and type(s) of cleaning allowed
- Determine if locker use will be allowed, if not where will materials/coats be stored
- Determine if "spacing and flow" through hallways, cafeterias and open seating area markings are required and if so, install
- Re-order/stocking of cleaning/disinfectant supplies for each facility
- Set classrooms up with allowed seating distances as determined by Health Department
- Re-sanitize facilities as directed, throughout the day, if required
